top tips



1. Use friendly, generic address such as 'Dear Friend'
 2. Some of the people receiving Christmas cards will have experienced trauma or fled conflict zones. Your message should be one of solidarity for people going through a difficult time.
 3. Not everyone receiving cards will be Catholic/Christian. We advise you not to include any overtly religious messages - make it inclusive for all faiths and nationalities!
 4. But do feel free to wish someone a Merry Christmas!
 5. Don't include your full name or contact details in the card
